

SOME & ANY





Some is generally used in positive (affirmative) sentences.

- There are **some** flowers in a vase on the table.
- He needs some medicine.

Exception To The Rule: 'Some' can also be used in questions if you are offering something to someone or asking for something by thinking that the answer is yes or hopes for such an answer.

• Would you like some cofee?

Any is generally used in negative sentences.

- There aren't any students in the school.
- I dont want to drink any fruit juice.

Any is used in questions.

- Do we have any bread in the house?
- He hasn't received any e-mails yet.

Exception To The Rule: Any can only be used in positive sentences if it is used with conjunctions such as If and weather.

We'll always help you if you have any problems or troubles.



We use A or AN with singular nouns.

A is used when a noun starts with a consonant sound;

e.g. A dog, a book, etc.

AN is used when a noun starts with a vowel sound; e.g. An apple, an hour, etc. We use **SOME** with countable nouns (only with their plural) and with uncountable nouns.

SOME is used in:

* positive sentences;

e.g. I have got some time.

* questions, expressing requests and offers;

E.g. Would you like some tea? Can I have some biscuits? We use **ANY** with countable nouns (only with their plural) and with uncountable nouns.

ANY is used in:

negative sentences;

e.g. I haven't got any time.

* general questions;

e.g. Have you got any sisters? Is there any tea left?

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(request)

We use "some" in positive sentences. We use some for both countable and uncountable nouns.Example: I have some friends. - I have some time. We use "any" in negative sentences or questions. We use any for both countable and uncountable nouns. Example: Do you have any fruit? He doesn't have any fruit. Do you have any stamps? We use "some" in questions when offering or requesting something that is there. Example: Would you like some bread? (offer) -May I have some water?
