In this lecture we are going to talks about many important expressions such as much, many, some, any,...

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We will briefly explain how to use them in the sentences:

1- *many* & *much* :

Many is used for count nouns: I have *many* eggs in the refrigerator.

Much is used for uncount nouns: we don't have **much** milk.

2- some & any :

Some is used in questions that are request or offers: can I have **some** cakes?, would you like **some** tea?

*The same rules are applied with *Someone*.

Any is used with questions and negatives: Hello, is anybody here?, there is not anywhere to go in my town.

3- *a few & a little :*

A Few is used with count nouns: there are a few cigarettes left.

A Little is used with uncount nouns : can you give me a little help?

4- a lot & lots of :

We use *a lot & lots of* with both count and uncount nouns: there is *a lot of* butter, I have got *lots of* friends.

*A lot of & lots of can be used in questions and negative: are there lots of people in the hospital? , there is not a lot of coffee over the shelf.

5- Articles a, an, the:

- The indefinite articles *a*, *an* is used with singular, countable nouns to refer to a thing or idea for the first time: I have *a* car, There is *a* supermarket over there, I have got *an* apple.
- The definite article *the* is used with singular and plural, countable and uncountable nouns when both the speaker and the listener already know the thing or the idea: I went to *the* supermarket to get some vegetables.
